LETTER FROM THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Let me begin by saying, "Thank you!" to all of our supporters, volunteers, and participants and families. You are what makes all of our efforts possible and worthwhile. Without the support of funders and volunteers, none of the hard work we do would be possible. Year after year our funders like the America One Foundation, the Division of Boating and Waterways, and the Department of Children Youth and their Families ensures we have the necessary means to employ our staff and provide the equipment needed to run our programs. The St. Francis Sailing Foundation deserves a special note of gratitude as they stepped up to save our STEM based Set Sail Learn program and provide for our Envision Academy Sailing Team with a 3-year commitment totaling \$150,000. It is only through volunteerism that many of the programs and fundraisers are possible. I would also like to thank my staff who in my first year as Executive Director, have made enormous effort to follow my lead as I strode to improve our facility and learned to lead my first youth driven organization — Thank you!

2015 saw marked improvement in many areas at TISC. Programmatically, we saw a total of 550 more individuals than we did a year ago serving 2,494 people with over 26,000 hours of instruction. Our youth participants were up 450 kids, and our adult program grew over 300%. Our Set Sail Learn (SSL) program continues to grow and be successful, and in 2015 we added another 200 students over 2014 serving 1,338 San Francisco public school 4th and 5th graders. This program continues to be a hit among teachers filling up the schedule months in advance. We continue to provide Bay Area afterschool programs with 3 hour Orientations. This program gives about 700 mostly urban and under-served youth an opportunity to sail for the first time. Between SSL and Orientations TISC gives 2000 kids an introduction to sailing, water safety and San Francisco Bay each year. TISC's summer camp and spring/fall progression programs continue to be the staple for developing lifelong sailors and good citizens and stewards of the Bay. Having almost 400 kids in our progression program allows us to develop quality sailors and continues to feed our instructor staff. This progression from student to staff is the most exciting aspect of our regular programming and completes our organizational 'Circle of Sailing'.

Organizationally our program was also improved. We added a professional Human Resource partner as well as a contract grant writer who was instrumental in cultivating new and sustainable partnerships. In 2015 we added the TK Foundation, Colocation America, and The Olympic Club Foundation who we hope will continue to support our program. Our biggest accomplishment in this area was our expanded relationship with the St. Francis Sailing Foundation who has now become our biggest single donor. The StFSF who has supported US Olympic athletes for years, expanded their scope to include San Francisco public school children in support of our SSL program. StFSF also dedicated support to our EAST members ensuring the continued development of a High School sailing team at this Oakland charter school.

As we begin the 2016 season, attention is being taken to further develop our curriculum. We look to continue teaching kids basic water safety to advanced sailing while emphasizing human development. This season will bring more adult engagement as TISC now can offer an accredited US Sailing Basic Keelboat Course. We will also look to install a community 'use' program which will allow the general public to begin to rent and use our fleet. The involvement of the entire community will lead TISC forward and allow us to become the Bay's central access point for all things sailing.

The future of Treasure Island Sailing Center looks bright. The continual growth in participation, expanded programs, further reach, and development of the Island itself are solidifying TISC as an integral part of the San Francisco Bay community. From all the staff, volunteers, Board of Directors and especially our participants, we thank you for your support as we continue to be the 'Launching Point for New Horizons'.

JUNIOR SAILING

Since its inception in 1999, TISC's Jr. program's goal has been to develop life skills through the sport of sailing. Our five-part progression program takes youth from entry level sailing to traditional instruction and finishes with leadership and instruction. At each level, skills such as goal-setting, communication, team work, environmental stewardship, self-reliance and leadership are intertwined. This year we continued fine tune our program while turning out the next generation of sailing instructors.

REFLECTION FROM ISA

Treasure Island Sailing Center first sparked my passion for sailing and racing. I started sailing at age seven and by junior high school, I began racing at TISC. TISC has provided me with a community of warmhearted, open minded people who push me to improve my sailing abilities while teaching me how to be a better leader, team player, and person every day.

JR LEADERSHIP PROGRAMS

TISC's Junior Leadership Program is designed for our oldest and most advanced Jr. Sailors who are looking to build their leadership and coaching skills while also continuing to develop their sailing knowledge and skills. As Jr. Instructors, participants are paired with a mentor coach under the direct supervision of the Program Director. While working to develop the skills of a US Sailing Level 1 Certified Instructor, Jr. Instructors receive developmentally appropriate training both on and off the water helping them to become well-rounded sailors, good teachers and responsible workers.

In 2015, TISC Jr. Leadership Programs reached 6 Jr. Sailors; 3 as Jr. Instructors Level 1, and 3 as Jr. Instructors Level 2. We were incredibly impressed with the caliber and dedication of our 2015 Jr. Leadership cohort.

SET SAIL LEARN

TISC is on the cutting edge of experiential STEM education, hosting 4th grade classes for developmentally appropriate lessons where students learn to sail and go sailing to learn. Through our Set Sail Learn program in 2015, TISC reached 1,338 students across 51 schools in the San Francisco Unified School District. Since Set Sail Learn began in 2013, TISC has reached 2,940 students through the program

With a range of dynamic hands-on lessons on and off the water, TISC instills valuable 21st century skills in an inquiry-based learning environment designed to foster an appreciation for our invaluable shared natural resource — the Bay. The Set Sail Learn program offers the flexibility to choose from three STEM based programs: Ecology of the Bay, Maritime History, and Power of the Wind. Each Set Sail Learn program runs as a one day, four hour long program.

The St Francis Foundation Partners with TISC

In addition to 2015 grants from the Mellam, TK, and Colocation America Foundations, the St. Francis Sailing Foundation made a \$40,000/year commitment to Set Sail Learn (SSL) through 2017. TISC can now insure that SSL remains a permanent offering to the city's fourth graders after a successful pilot program in 2014.

"Access to the Bay provides an exciting way to learn STEM principles," said Carisa Harris-Adamson, Chair of TISC Board of Directors. "Thanks to the vision of St. Francis Sailing Foundation, we now have the necessary funding to provide innovative school lessons while also introducing many of the children to sailing for the first time. Children who show interest in the sport from this introduction can continue sailing in our after school or summer sailing programs, which offer scholarships to thousands of children each year."

EAST

In line with our mission to make sailing more accessible to all kids in the Bay Area, TISC hosts the Envision Academy of Arts and Technology — a tuition-free charter high school in Oakland — in their development of a competitive high school sailing team.

The Envision Academy Sailing Team (EAST) practices year round through TISC. In 2015 the EAST sailing team had 8 participating sailors. With on the water practices and classroom based chalk talks EAST is working diligently to prepare for team's first sanctioned Pacific Coast Interscholastic Sailing Association (PCISA) regatta which takes place in early 2016. EAST's is almost entirely funded by the St. Francis Sailing Foundation and TISC, however the vision and initial support came from Anthony Sandberg and OCSC.



AMOSI

I have been a part of the Envision Academy Sailing Team (E.A.S.T) from the start. Sailing has showed me the wonders of rigging and operating a sailboat and it has taught me the values of true teamwork. Learning to steer a sailboat gave me an understanding of how to steer a motor vehicle. It helped me gain knowledge for my later passage into the driving world. I felt like I wasn't good enough at one time, but one of our old coaches told me that I was as important as everyone else on the team. They told me that I am the glue that keeps the team together which boosted my self-esteem. My goals for 2016 are to become better at sailing and support my teammates in our trials to become a renowned high-school sailing team.

My name is Amanda Ceja and I am on the Envision Academy Sailing Team. I am in the 12th grade and I have been on the sailing team for about two years now. Sailing has impacted my life by giving me a chance to discover something I really enjoy and to try something new in the sports section. As a result of sailing, I am able to work with people with different personalities, work in a natural situations I have no control over, and to communicate well with others. Being on the sailing team has helped me improve my communication skills. I use to be shy talking to people but now I am able to have a conversation with someone I am going to spend time with. My goal for 2016's season is to improve even more on being crew and be a good co-captain to my team.

CHRISTINE

My name is Christine Brown and I am on the Envision Academy Sailing Team. I have been on the team for two years now. I love being able to escape all my responsible for a few days just to do something I enjoy doing. Sailing is a stress reliever that I get once a week. It is like therapy for me. Sailing is also a way for my friends and I to participate in a fun and safe activity together. I am able to communicate in a more efficient way that is understandable and direct for others due to being on the team. That is a reason why I have excellent grades, I know how to work in a group to achieve something. Lastly, my goal for 2016 is to become comfortable in being the skipper because that is something that gets me nervous, but I know with more practice, I can succeed.

COMMUNITY SAILING - YOUTH

TISC's Youth Community Sailing Programs reached 627 students throughout the course of the 2015 summer season. Our week long Explore Sailing Group classes saw 122 students, with 81% receiving full or partial scholarship. Our half day Group Orientation classes saw 505 students, with 91% receiving full or partial scholarship. Working with these afterschool programs allows TISC, through either one week or three hour long sails, to provide youth their first sailing experience. These sails also are a great way for TISC to increase its reach as many of these youth come back and join TISC's longer more in-depth programs.

REFLECTION FROM ROY JOHNSON

This summer I participated in TISC's adult dinghy sailing course. The course was an extremely valuable experience. I just started sailing this year and this class helped me build the skills and knowledge to progress in the sport.

We started the course with some basic classroom instruction, then moved on to safety and capsize drills in the water. By the end of the first afternoon everyone in the class had acted as both skipper and crew. On day two we jumped back in the water, albeit with extremely light wind. The day was still valuable to practice our handling and movements in light wind conditions. The instructor Sterling was awesome!

I am so glad that I had the opportunity to sail with TISC. The services they provide deserve greater recognition. They have wonderful, skilled and patient instructors and provide the community great access to the water. In San Francisco we are surrounded by water but very few members of the community get to sail. TISC is one of the very few centers that provides community access. I am looking forward to taking classes and private lessons at TISC in the future.

"One of the more rewarding aspects of keeping my boat at TISC is the opportunity to share the joy of sailing with others. As a volunteer for the Visually Impaired Sailing Program at TISC, I get the rare opportunity to learn how to sail using all my senses. How the Visually Impaired sailors use the feel of the boat, the wind on their faces, and the sound of the water to play the bay is nothing short of amazing. It is heartwarming to see the joy in their faces as they pilot their crafts in a confident seaman like manner."



ADAPTIVE SAILING

The TISC Adaptive Sailing Programs strive to make sailing accessible to anybody with a desire to learn. TISC instructors are trained to support the needs of each unique participant and promote safety both on and off the water. TISC's Adaptive Sailing program makes use of boats that keep sailors safe while still allowing for a fun, exciting, and educational experience, including Access Dinghies and J24's. In 2015 TISC continued to work with local programs to promoting sailing for physically and developmentally disabled sailing students, reaching a total of 54 participants for the year.

Visually Impaired Sailing

Offered in partnership with the Marin Sailing School Program for the Blind, visually impaired sailing students learn the basics of sailing while focusing on steering and trimming the sails. Visually Impaired Sailing at TISC is held in the Spring, Summer, and Fall on J24s where each boat has two trained sighted crew members and two visually impaired sailors of matched or complimentary skill levels. Our Visually Impaired Sailors have gone on to compete in US Sailing Sanctioned Visually Impaired Regattas at the local and national levels.

Co-Able Jr. Sailing Program

Offered in partnership with the Bay Area Association of Disabled Sailors (BAADS.org), this TISC Jr. Sailing Program takes place at the BAADS facility on Pier 40 on the San Francisco waterfront. Students with disabilities learn to sail with a friend in a small, stable, and safe sailboat boat in the protected waters of McCovey Cove. Co-Able Jr Sailors sail in pairs to build teamwork, communication, and sailing skills.

Burton High School

In partnership with Burton High School, TISC hosts a group of five disabled high school sailors (2015 students pictured above). This High School sailing program takes place in the fall and spring and is designed to help these sailors develop their sailing, teamwork, communication, independence, and socialemotional skills. The Burton High School Sailing Program is run with a trained TISC instructoras well as a Burton High School teacher.

Adaptive Sailing Orientations

TISC is able to accommodate many groups of disabled sailors with introductory sailing classes on our J24 fleet. These orientations are tailored to each groups unique needs and skill sets to provide the safest and most dynamic sailing experience possible.

program highlights 2016

JR. PROGRAM DEVELOPMENT

As we seek to develop strong, resilient and independent children through sailing, TISC continuously looks for ways to improve the impact our classes have on our kids – both on and off of the water. In 2016, our focus will be on re-structuring our curriculum to improve our instructional quality and consistency. With the addition of increased curricular detail and structure, we will provide intensive instructor training, mentorship and support to implement the new curriculum. In keeping our programmatic focus on skills including goal setting, communication, leadership, and stewardship, our curriculum enhancements will focus on developing clear course learning outcomes that are tied to specific assessments. What does this mean? TISC instructors will be able to identify and track each child's progress, praise their achievements and identify opportunities for growth. Parents can expect a more detailed assessment of their child's experience and kids can expect a more fluent progression from one class to the next. We are excited to use technology to help us in this endeavor and will launch the use of an online interactive tool that allows instructors to easily track each child's progress, communicate progress to parents, and solicit valued feedback from parents, teachers and program directors. We are privileged to have the opportunity to teach kids in our community and make the most of every moment we have with them.

ADULT SAILING

TISC has secured its accreditation from US Sailing to teach the US Sailing Basic Keelboat course. Although TISC has offered keelboat classes to adults for years, this certification gives students a tangible transferable education which puts them on a path to independent sailing of boats both large and small. Like all TISC's programs, the revenue generated will help to offset and support the costs of youth programs. TISC will have also improved its keelboat fleet with new sails and running rigging.

COMMUNITY USE PROGRAM

In an effort to provide our participants with opportunities for independent sailing, in 2016 TISC will begin to introduce programs which allow our upper level sailors the use of our boats. As students progress through our sailing school offerings it seems imperative to provide avenues for both controlled practice and independent sailing. Students will have completed at least intermediate, advanced level or thorough check-outs as a way to achieve participation in this program. Our goal is to create weekend opportunities for our graduates to put their skills to use and enjoy the fruits of their labor. There are still many details to work out, however we anticipate having a full use program in place for 2017.





2015 FINANCIAL SUMMARY


In 2015 TISC's improved program revenue and fundraising goals were met. We ended the year with positive net earnings. While we made a significant withdrawal from our endowment account, our fundraising efforts and program revenue provided us with year-end positive cash flows. Having increased the overall budget to an all-time high to accommodate growth in programming, we used the year's stock market growth to insure TISC's stability. While the endowment fund income was used, it has grown 5% since it was created. We saw all our financial goals met in 2015

TISC's expense shows 94% dedicated to Programs. Almost all earned revenue is directly spent to support TISC's programs and mission. The majority of TISC's income comes from Programs, Government Grants, Foundations, and Tenant rents. In 2016 we will look to increase donations from private individuals in hopes that we can give out more scholarships than the \$160.000 we did in 2015.

SCHOLARSHIPS

TISC is committed to providing affordable sailing experiences and scholarships to youths and adaptive participants.

In 2015, 90% of our Jr. Sailors enrolled in Jr. Sailing, Adaptive, Set Sail Learn, and Youth Community Sailing Programs received full or partial scholarships. With the help from the St. Francis Sailing Foundation, TISC was also able to provide full scholarships, including transportation and meals to the Envision Academy Sailing Team (EAST).

TISC SCHOLARSHIP OVERVIEW

- Full scholarships for families that are on government assistance or have a combined household income of less than \$40,000
- Partial scholarships (50% of the class price) for families that have a combined household income of less than \$70,000
- Scholarships for families that do not meet our financial guidelines for a scholarship, but are in need because of special circumstances.

This season was all about meeting small goals for Charles both on and off the water. And "Blue Beary" Charles's stuffed bear was along for the ride.



During those first few weeks of Jr. Sailing Program, Charles was very quiet. He always had "Blue Beary" tucked into his lifejacket and would only go for boat rides, he was too nervous to even think about holding the mainsheet or steering. A few weeks went by and Charles was

feeling a bit more confident, and with "Blue Beary" now riding comfortably in the coach boat, he began holding the mainsheet and even steering with a friend. By the end of summer "Blue Beary" stayed on shore nestled in Charles's backpack, and Charles was single-handing in a Bug with all the confidence of an old pro.

Charles grew so much this summer and we cannot wait to see him again next year!

Thanks to the protected waters of Clipper Cove, TISC is one of the only places in the Bay children as young as six years old can learn to sail.
